"Proclaiming freedom for the captives." ISAIAH 61

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"God's reluctant therapist" by Steven Donaldson, M.A., L.P.C.

Ten years ago if someone had asked me where I wanted my career to go, the last thing I would have said was working with people who struggle with homosexuality and advocating in professional organizations for the right of clients to seek therapy for homosexuality.

Who would choose to become a therapist who was constantly questioned for his professional ethics and accused of being homophobic, hateful, ignorant, and harmful to his clients? I did not choose to do this type of work. God choose me. I am honored and humbled.

I see myself as a fairly typical therapist. I jumped through all the hoops: classes, internships, supervision, exams and licensure, then I began my practice. I sat through classes on human sexual development and was taught unequivocally that homosexuality was either in-born or so deeply rooted that attempts to change it were absurd and most probably harmful. Being a Christian, I had my doubts about this but did not have to think too much about it. I knew that the human race is deeply scared by many generations of sin. Some of the consequences of this sin we will be able to heal here on earth while others will need to wait until Jesus' return. It was completely conceivable to me that some well intended Christians may struggle with homosexual impulses through their entire lives and had no hope of changing.

Then one day a young man, we will call James, came into my office for an appointment. He said that he had heard I was a Christian and that I worked with men with sexual issues. I responded affirmatively to both questions and asked him what brought him to see me. He told me about a life long struggle with homosexual thoughts, feelings, and acts. This man was a deeply committed Christian and had never for a moment considered homosexuality to be God's plan for his life. He told me of his fear of intimacy with women and how he had never been able to be physically intimate with a woman, even in nonsexual ways.

I knew I was over my head already when his story became even more interesting. He explained that he had fallen deeply in love with a woman and wanted to marry her. He told me how after two years of dating he courageously told her everything about his sexual problems knowing that she would certainly and wisely call the relationship off. The problem was that she did not. She had confidence in him and in God's ability to heal him. Now what was he to do? He said, "I'll do anything I have to. I want to be a normal man. I want to be a husband and a father. I do not want to be homosexual."

The professional literature tells me that my duty as a therapist is to help this patient understand that his homosexual thoughts, feelings, and behaviors are normal, natural, and unchangeable. Then I should help him understand how the rejections of his homosexuality is a rejection of his true self and based on the ignorance of society about the true nature of homosexuality. It tells me that mental health for this man would be the acceptance of himself as a gay man. The only reason he would want to change is because of the hatred of homosexual people he had experienced directly or vicariously by ignorant, and homophobic people in his life.

This answer clearly would not fit for this man. In addition I could not give him this answer because I believe what the Bible says about sexuality. "For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and they will become one flesh." (Genesis 2:24) Central to the Christian message is the sanctification of all sexuality through marriage.

James was in terrible conflict. I felt very badly for him but I still was not very anxious because I knew what my next move was. When a therapist is not qualified to help a patient with a certain problem, it is his or her ethical duty to refer. I told James that I would find him a suitable Christian therapist that could help him and sent him on his way. Surely, I thought, there must be people who deal with this problem. It must be fairly common. The literature tells me



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that 10% of the population is homosexual. Many of these people, I thought must be Christian and need help with this problem. It was at this point that my education began. I could not find anyone doing this work. I later found out that there were some people in the area that were, but God apparently had something else in mind. Now I was the one with the conflict. I was unwilling to just tell James, "Good luck but I can't help you." I called him and said I would be willing to find literature to study and try to help him with his problem. I admitted I could not offer him much assurance of success. He was very grateful. I felt inadequate, alone, and uncomfortable taking money from someone I had so little confidence I could help.

What I did not realize is that I was not alone. God was operating all around me and my inadequacy made room for His adequacy. I had no idea that just four blocks north of my office a small group of dedicated Christians were running a program (Portland Fellowship) to help men and women overcome their struggles with homosexuality. I wonder if I would have ever known if God had not moved John and Anne Paulk into a



house across the street from mine. John and Anne are both ex-gay and were heavily involved in Portland Fellowship and Exodus International. I remember the day I was getting to know my new neighbor and I asked John about his occupation. He sheepishly told me he worked for Portland Fellowship and what that organization did. He didn't know what kind of reaction to expect from me. I was shocked, of course, but not for the reasons John naturally would have assumed. An instant friendship emerged.

Through my research I was also put in contact with an organization called NARTH (National Association for Research and Therapy of Homosexuality). It turns out that this is a very scholarly organization that was able to offer a great deal to me in terms of literature, consultation, and support. I began to understand that the majority of what I learned about homosexuality in school was very politically motivated and just plain wrong. The emotional rhetoric on both sides of this issue is so intense that truth is hard to come by in the literature. I learned that Christians need to shoulder a good share of the blame for this. We have not responded to the homosexual with the love of Christ and a deep sense of our own sin. In our sinful pride we have treated the homosexual unsympathetically. There is good reason for the gay community's anger at us. We (the Church) need to seek God's forgiveness for our sin.

My work with James over the next several years taught me a lot about the nature of homosexuality and God's ability to heal a humble soul. As we identified the roots and causes of his sexual desires and he courageously faced his fears, he was able to develop into a fully functioning heterosexual man, husband, and father. He was able to develop a healthy pride in the man that God had made him to be. He was able to assume his role as a leader in his church. Like many men, under periods of stress he can have intrusive sexual thoughts and feelings but he would tell you that he was able to fully accomplish

his therapy goals. This is what the professional literature had told me was not possible.

It is important to mention that not all the men I have worked with have been this successful. Homosexuality is a very deeply embedded problem that men and women struggle with mightily. They did not choose to have these feelings and cannot simply will them away. Some of the men I see have worked very hard and not achieved the success they would like. I do not have all the psychological or theological answers. I do know, however, that having homosexual feelings is not hopeless. People that have unwanted sexual attraction should seek help.

I have been involved with Portland Fellowship for the last five years. Over this period I have developed a deep respect for this organization, its mission, and the courageous and God-inspired people that have followed God's call into this ministry. I personally am a financial supporter. There are three reasons I believe it is urgent for the Christian individual and Christian community as a whole to support this organization with their prayers and their checkbooks.

First we need to care for our own. I know from my experience that there are many very good men and women in the Christian community that struggle with homosexuality in silence and very alone. Some are married and others are single. Many are faithful husbands and wives, dedicated fathers and mothers, and participating church members. They deserve our help and God's healing. The individual congregation does not have the resources or expertise to help these individuals. It is naive and wrong for us to simply pray for them and tell them to get over it. That is like watching our child break her arm and telling her that we will pray for her. This response is simply inadequate. First we rush our precious one to the hospital, then we pray for them. Portland Fellowship is a wonderful resource for our brothers and sisters in Christ who struggle with homosexuality.

Second, Portland Fellowship is a beacon of light in a lost world. Many unsaved and unchurched souls long for the peace of Christ. We see many that find Christ through their struggle with homosexuality. Jesus continues to be the answer for a lost and dying world. Homosexuality can become a very deep and dark hole for a lost child of God. Portland Fellowship is a powerful tool that God is using to save these precious individuals.

Third, Portland Fellowship is a tremendous support and resource for mental health professionals and clergy like myself who have been called to hold the line against the powerful professional and religious communities that seek to normalize and promote homosexuality in our society. I could never have been as effective in my work and advocacy without the emotional support, testimonies, and resources of Portland Fellowship and other organization like it.


