

The Love of The Father by Drew Berryessa

"Eternal Father"- That is what the banner declared as it hung on the wall of the chapel, seemingly mocking me. Even though I was standing in this huge room, surrounded by hundreds of other worshipers singing beautiful praise music, all I could do is stare at that banner, and cry.

That was last June. Fast forward to this last month. I am standing in another room, a much smaller, quieter room. Once again, all I can do is stare and cry. These, however, are very different tears. They are tears of joy. It is somewhere around 3 a.m. and I am sure that I am probably exhausted, although right now nothing matters except the focus of my gaze...my beautiful newborn daughter Elaina.

It is amazing the difference a year can make. Last summer the staff of Portland Fellowship attended a conference in Wheaton, Illinois. I could not help but feel, as we prepared to leave for the trip that God was going to do some business in my heart. It had been a pretty intense year for me. It is common knowledge around here that God is never finished doing the work of healing and restoration in our lives. By the time last summer came around, I had already been a good six months into working through some pretty deep wounds within my family. Although things were beginning to get somewhat resolved, my heart was still a bit raw. I have to admit I had no idea what impact this would have on my experience at the conference. But I had the distinct feeling that I was being prepared for something. I had my answer the first morning worship service. As my eyes scanned the chapel, my sight locked on an ornate banner on the wall. It seems so silly to think about now, but when I read those words "Eternal Father" my heart broke.

As with many who come to our ministry, my relationship with my father had suffered significant wounds throughout my childhood. This affected the way I related to not only him, but our Heavenly Father as well. Here is a profound truth that has proved itself in most every person that I have encountered, homosexual struggler or not: The relationship that you have with your father on earth provides the filter by which you relate to God the Father. This was made clear to me my first year as a participant in our program *Taking Back Ground*. Up to that point in my life I had never even considered that as a reality. However in the years to follow, I became increasingly aware of the impact this had on my walk with the Lord. This had come to a climax in the month preceding the conference.

It is amazing how deceived and single-minded we can become in regards to our own woundedness. This past year has proved that to me. I love my dad deeply, and I know that he loves me, but it had been a

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struggle to really know and believe in his love for me. For years, I viewed my relationship with my father as a work in progress. I am ashamed to say that I had, in my selfishness and immaturity, an attitude that it was all his work to do. When looking at the hurt in our relationship, I never considered that I needed to ask forgiveness, or that I had been guilty of hurting him as well. It was only through a season of pain that my dad and I were able to come to a place of honesty that helped me understand my role in damaging our relationship. It was a tremendously difficult season, and an even more difficult conversation, and yet the healing and life that it has brought I would not trade for anything. All this preceded the moment that I found myself staring at the banner, tears streaming down my face.

I was shocked at the thought going through my head as my focus remained on those two words "Eternal Father." I was angry...very angry. The streams of accusation flowed from my mind at a speed and intensity that I had never allowed.

"Why would you choose to call yourself that?? Where were you when I needed you?? Do you like pouring salt in my wounds??" There were many other accusations that my heart made against the character of God in that moment. Years of not really being able to believe that he loved me bled out through these cries and through my tears.

After the initial rush of anger subsided, there was left this deep feeling of sorrow as a realization came over me. Just the same as with my earthly father, I had held this distorted view in which I did

not acknowledge my own responsibility. I knew in my head that God was always with me, and that he was, like the Bible said, a perfect Father. But my heart could never embrace that. My own unbelieving heart was what had damaged my relationship with God.

In light of such a realization, the only response that seems appropriate is repentance. I don't know what was going on with the other worshipers in that moment, I don't even know if the worship music had ended and the lecture had began or not. It felt like I was no longer the room. It was just me and God. As I poured out my heart to God, asking forgiveness for my attitude and my accusations, something surreal

happened. Because this type of thing does not happen often to me, it is a little hard to explain. It was like I could actually see God the Father embracing me, and as He did this, he said two simple words... "It's okay." That was just the beginning.

Now back to that small, quiet room. It is a year later and many things in my life have changed. The last nine months my wife Suzanne and I had been anticipating and preparing for this moment. Our daughter is here. After the initial business of the delivery, the nurses have gone and Suzanne is finally able to sleep. It is amazing how quiet a room can suddenly become. So there we were, just me and my newborn daughter. For the first time in this whole process of pregnancy and delivery the reality truly hit me. I began to cry silently...I couldn't help it, she is just so beautiful! It is indescribable the depth of love that I have for her. I would give my life for this little girl. As I sat rocking my daughter to sleep in my arms, God, in utmost tenderness, chose to answer the question, or rather the

accusation, that I made a year earlier. It was barely a whisper, but it was there. "Drew, you know how much you love your daughter. Then you can begin to understand the love I have for my children." For the first time in my life I really began to understand the love of the heavenly Father, and the love that my earthly father has for me. This is described well in Psalm 103:11-13

For as high as the heavens are above the earth, so great is his love for those who fear him; as far as the east is from the west, so far has he

from the west, so far has he removed our transgressions from us; As a father has compassion on his children, so the LORD has compassion on those who fear him.

I now understand why God *chooses* to call himself our Father...because he *is* our Father. A perfect Father who loves perfectly. Children are meant to look at thier earthly fathers to understand who God is and how God loves his children. And now, as Elaina's father, that is my calling. I have the privilege of showing her, throughmy love for her, a reflection of God the Fathers love for His children. A complete, unconditional love. A love of indescribable depth. May all of us who are called fathers be up to such a high calling.
