PORTLAND fellowship

Last month, I attended my ninth Annual Exodus Conference in Irvine, California. Each year the conference proves to be a great time of connecting with other leaders who work in similar ministries from all around the world. This year was no different, but started out a bit interesting.

The day I arrived, I learned that some of the students from the multicultural class on campus got drunk the night before, vandalized some of the Exodus material, and wrote provocative things in chalk on the sidewalk outside the leaders' rooms indicating, of course, that we were not welcome. I also was aware that two miles away, a group of people who were at odds with the mission of Exodus were holding their own conference titled, "Beyond Ex-gay: A survivor's Conference." And to top it off the media was having a field day after cornering Alan Chambers, President of Exodus, on the issue of "change" questioning whether people actually experience it 100%.

I knew I was in for a fascinating week.

Being someone who is not afraid of confrontation, I went that evening to the dorm quad that housed the 30 or so summer school students. They were again involved in drinking but invited me in. My first question to some of the slightly inebriated guys was, "So out of curiosity, who was it that vandalized our stuff, and more importantly, why?" At first everyone denied any involvement, and then one guy slipped a confession: "Because you guys are homophobes and try to change gays and that is wrong." I was grateful for his honesty. Within a matter a minutes several people were huddled around with their cheap beers in hand listening to my story of how God transformed my life from one of bondage of unwanted sexual desires to a life of freedom and peace. All week long I would see these students on campus and it was evident that they had a different perspective on the core message of the conference.

we, in any way, had contributed to their wounds.

The evening before the Ex-ex-gay conference started, several of us went to their campus to pray. (If you are a little confused, "ex-ex-gays" are men and women who sought change but then found the journey to be too painful and now are content being gay as well as speaking out against the message of freedom). All sorts of prayers were prayed that night, and the prayer of my heart was that the Lord would minister to these men and women and would forgive us if

The day of their conference I went with two other leaders to visit them. They were grateful we stopped by. A great sadness and a measure of confusion came over me. What happened to these men and women? In what ways do our ministries contribute to their pain? What are we saying or not saying, doing, or not doing that we can learn to do differently. Obviously, our foundational understanding of God's truth is different than theirs and these differences can never be reconciled. At the same time, we in Exodus ministries don't always do everything right. There is room for us to learn.

Alan Chamber's comments on CNN and in the Los Angeles Times were an example of our need to learn how better to communicate the powerful transforming work of Christ. How can we adequately share this amazing process to a world that doesn't know Jesus? How do we talk about the work of sanctification, struggles, freedom from bondage, and temptation to a world (and even many in the church) that doubts that change is even possible?

Many don't find my answer satisfactory. My answer is simply to live my life and boldly share how God is at work in and through me. He continues to refine me and will do so until I die. Homosexual desires have no power over my life. Not for a moment have I considered leaving my wife and children

Please join me in praying for the students in the multicultural class and for the countless others that are misinformed - that they would hear the truth of God. Let that truth be proclaimed in the church, on the television, and even in the dorm rooms – if need be over cheap beer. I also pray for all who serve at Portland Fellowship that we will be
