We are now rejoicing in the return of our Prodigal Son and hope to kill the fatted calf and have you all join in with us for a time of feasting and celebration. - Here is (part) of his email:

Family,


I want to come home with a heart of repentance, prepared to do whatever necessary to leave this lifestyle behind and to follow Christ (and only Christ). The truth is, I don't know how to reconcile a gay lifestyle with my faith, and I don't think I will ever be able to.

I know that this is the Godly decision and that there will be infinite (quite literally) blessing that comes from it, but I also know that there will be a very immediate difficulty of backing my way out of my current life, habits, thought patterns, social connections, work environment, etc. There are some major challenges that I see ahead, some practical and some ideological, and I want to use my time at home to talk with you and others about how to begin overcoming these issues, because frankly, I need help.

The main issue? My pride and my general feeling that if I work hard enough, I can

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solve any issue. I know that I can't, and I will need to constantly remind myself that without Christ, I am nothing. I guess the long and short of all of this is that I'll need a lot of support, and at the same time will feel a tug to resist that support whenever my pride kicks in. Please pray for me in this area especially.

I love you all so much and I want to be a part of my immediate family and the Church family once again.
