Dear Fellowship Partners,

For the past three years I've been involved in a unique group of men that get together in my neighborhood to discuss life. We call our group "Finer Things" taken from an episode of the show 'The Office'. Our group is comprised of four generations of men and a variety of experiences, struggles, and perspectives. Two of us experienced the pain and grief of the death of our children, a couple of us are dealing with unemployment, and all of us are children of God working out our salvation. From the beginning, we made it clear that Finer Things was a place to be honest, process life, ask hard questions and not be criticized for any of it. It's rare to have opportunities in everyday life to ask questions about things that generally

are not allowed to be questioned. Simply asking questions can provoke strong negative responses in others especially when it is expected that the person asking should know the answer: the pastor asking "Where is God?", the far-right Republican asking "Could the Democrats be right on this?", the missionary asking "Is my role even necessary?", or the Bible school student asking, "Is the Bible really true"?

I'm thankful that Portland Fellowship is like Finer Things. We have a clear mission statement and unwavering core values. Yet within that framework, we offer the freedom for people to struggle with their belief and their feelings. Just last week I had an appointment with a 16 year-old boy of a prominent leader in our community. From our first few minutes of meeting it was apparent that he agreed to meet with me to appease his father. But his resolve to live a gay life was evident both verbally and

nonverbally. He professed to be a Christian, yet saw homosexuality differently than what his church taught. And although he professed Christ as Savior he shared with me that he doesn't know how to have a relationship with him. At this point in his life the relationship with his boyfriend fills this felt need.

This young man didn't need a debate. He didn't need to be told he was wrong and to get in line with the true teachings of Christ. What he needed was someone to listen to him to hear his heart and meet him there in his need. As he shared his perspective, it was apparent that his relational needs were so profound that he was willing to compromise his relationship with his family, his church, and with God.

Drew wrote a great article last month's *Fellowship Message* called "Looking past the 'what' to see the 'why'" that emphasizes this point when he reflected on Proverbs 27:7, "A person who is full refuses honey, but even bitter food tastes sweet to the hungry." This proverb is a powerful anchor for discussion with people hungry for relationship. As I continued to talk with the 16 year old, we talked about the deeper needs of his heart. It didn't take long before he shared the desire to know God in a deeper way. He reflected back, only a year, when he had a hunger for the Lord, but openly acknowledged how the world and his friends have

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become his interest. The rest of our time had nothing to do with homosexuality, but rather about our Father who is madly in love with us and about his desire to embrace us, even in our defilement. In our short one hour, defenses came down, possibilities rose, and a seed of hope was deposited in his spirit.

I'm glad our Father in Heaven is okay with honest questions. Thomas, the 'doubter', questioned the most crucial truth in all of Christendom, the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. If there is anything you should be square on, it is the Resurrection. Yet Thomas said, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were and put my hand into his side, I will not believe it." Jesus, didn't give him a look of disgust or dismissed him for his doubts, but rather said to him. "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe."

My hope and prayer is that we as leaders will model Jesus' compassion and grace by meeting strugglers where they are in their process as well as lovingly lead them to trust and believe in the knowledge and love of Christ. I hope you, our friends and supporters, will continue to join us in seeing lives redeemed and like our 16 year old prodigal, find their way home to the Father.
