

"Why, God?"... by Scott Hartzell

Proverbs 3:5-6 "**TRUST** in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in **ALL** your ways acknowledge Him and He will make your paths straight." There is so much comfort and truth laced within this verse, yet for as long as I can remember, the theme question of my life to God was "Why?"

I grew up in a loving Christian home, but "why, God, did I still feel empty?" My father was in the Navy for about the first five years of my life. I have few memories of him until he returned home at about the same time that my little brother was born. I remember thinking that he was only home because my brother was born. "Why, God, wasn't he home for me?" I know this now to be untrue, but my perception

at that age was such that I did feel he loved my brother more than I and that's when I made an almost unconscious decision to reject him. In so doing, I was pushing away the one person that could affirm my own masculinity.

I accepted the Lord when I was in 2nd grade. I was so excited that I was telling everybody the next day at school. No one returned my excitement. "Why, God, was no one as excited about this as I was?" By around the third grade the other boys in class began making fun of me, and calling me names like girl, gay, fag and so on. I didn't know what being gay or a fag even was at that time. "Why, God, are they making fun of me? What did I do? Why, God, are You letting this happen?" It became much easier to be friends with girls, and all throughout my school years the closest friends I had were girls. "Why, God, don't the other boys like me? Why am I different?" I tried playing soccer in the 5th grade where there was a boy on the team who consistently teased me and even got physically aggresive a couple times. When my family decided to move that year, I was excited to start over in a new school and a new area. I thought maybe

things would be different, but I was wrong. The teasing continued even there. There was one boy in particular that consistently teased me throughout middle and high school. "Why, God? Why me?" In 8th grade, after an incidence with this kid, I walked into the boys restroom. "Why, God, am I alive?" I began to pound my head against the cement wall, hoping that it would take the pain away and even take my life away. I ended up passing out and had gashed my head open slightly giving myself a mild concussion. When people asked what happened I just told them I was running late to class and ran into another student. No one questioned that. "Why, God, am I still alive?"

At this point, I had learned to keep things bottled in and just retreated into myself to nurse the pain. About my freshman year, I discovered porn. This was the start of my porn addiction, but also became an outlet for my pain and stress. "Why, God, do I enjoy this when I know it's so wrong?" During my freshman year in high school I was molested by a substitute teacher in the restroom. I immediately reported it to a counselor. Shaking and scared, I was taken to the principle to tell him my story. The

principle called the teacher down with me in the office, confronted him, and of course he denied it. Why, God? What is wrong with me? My parents and I tried pressing charges. The police did their investigation, during which they took me into a room alone and basically said that they felt I had provoked the teacher. Also, since he was African American, they somehow concluded that I must have been prejudice and wanted to get him in trouble. Am I really gay? Why are you letting this happen?

My parents wanted me to get counseling but I told them I was fine. Why God? Why would anyone care?

I did not have my first sexual experience with another man until after high school. This encounter turned into many. All the while I was leading this double life, involved in church and worship, hung out with friends, but no one knew what was happening in the dark. I reached a point when I could

no longer handle the duplicity of my life. I was about to drive my truck off a bridge and in that moment I called out to God one last time before hitting the gas.

I audibly heard him speak the words "Eugene Bible College". It was enough to prevent me from driving over the edge. I looked into the college and in the fall of 1998, I left all that I knew and trekked 2000+ miles away to attend Bible College. It wasn't long until a male student leader caught me at a vulnerable time and brought my life spiraling back into the duplicity of Bible student by day and sex addict by night. Why, God, can't I be free of this?

I was married in 2003 to a woman who was beautiful both inside and out. She had a son that I adopted just after we married. The pressure of trying to be a husband and father, when I hadn't a clue what it meant to be a man, was overwhelming, not to mention the pressure of being responsible for more than just myself. I turned to old ways of coping and soon brought adultery into my marriage. When a prominent leader in Colorado fell, I began thinking that I did not want to be in my 50's and have all of this catch up with me and destroy my family and ministry. Up to this point, my wife knew about my struggles but I had always presented it in a way that indicated it was no longer an issue. I had read many books, been to many seminars and conferences, and even attended dozens of counseling sessions. I finally decided to get connected to Portland Fellowship. I had found them online years before and even spoke with the current director at that time. I was now ready to face these issues in my life and get all the answers to the "Why God?" questions that I had. The Lord met me in amazing ways, surrounding me with love and with others that had the same struggles. To know I was not alone was very freeing. I confessed to my wife the adultery that had taken place and she met me with complete grace and love and forgiveness. Why, God, is she sticking this out with me? God revealed His heart as he answered, "She

loves you and so do I!" At that moment no other "why's" mattered. My wife showed me the unconditional love that my heavenly Father has for me.

I completed the Taking Back Ground program at Portland Fellowship in 2008. Through the program, the Lord revealed a lot to me about my past. He helped me to give it all to Him and to trust Him with my future. It was difficult to trust others, and more importantly to trust God with the deepest, darkest

caverns of my heart. As I stopped trying to figure it out on my own and allowed others and God to speak into my life, and to surrender my fears and my failures to Him. It became easier and easier to walk in the direction He had planned for my life, as opposed to the one spoken over me. Though not ALL my "why" questions were answered, and probably never will be, He has taken many of those "whys" and turned them into "whats." What can I learn from this, Lord? What do you want to do in me? What can I do to bring You glory?

The Message version of Proverbs 3:5-6 says "...don't try to figure out everything on your own. Listen for God's voice in everything you do, everywhere you go; He's the one who will keep you on track. Don't assume that you know it all. Run to God! Run from evil!" Though I don't understand it all, I have learned to trust in Him, and to trust that what His word says is true. I can trust that He has "plans for my life, plans to prosper me and not to harm me, plans to give me a future and a hope", and trust that He has only good things in store for me. Learning to trust not in my own understanding which is so limited, but to trust Him in everything and acknowledge Him and He will guide me. One of my favorite Third Day songs (Take it All) says it best "All the roads that lie before me, all the struggles I go through, every second I am reminded that it all belongs to you. Now I'm ready to let it go, to give it away. Take it all cause I can't take it any longer. With all I have, I can't make it on my own. Take the first, take the last, take the good and take the rest. Here I am, all I have, take it all."


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"destiny bridge" by frank worthen - a book review by nate

San Francisco has long held an attraction for gay men and women. Frank Worthen, one of the most admired men among those who are walking the journey out of homosexuality, gives us a peek into his life growing up in the San Francisco Bay Area during the 1950s and beyond. His new book, Destiny Bridge is a testament to the faithfulness of God in one man's life. It's also a valuable resource for those interested in the emergence of what has become a nationally known ministry (Exodus International) for men and women seeking freedom from same-sex attraction.

Raised in San Jose, young Frank Worthen shared many of the factors common to homosexually-oriented men: an emotionally distant father, an overly attentive mother, and of course, the feeling that he was "different". In fact, the first words his grade school teacher said to his mother was, "Your son is very different." School became a nightmare and ultimately led to fits of rage during which Frank would take a sledge hammer to the house or set small fires. Isolation, too, found him labeled a "loner".

At around the age of 12, he "accepted Jesus" into his life and at the encouragement of his organ teacher, was baptized. Not long after, a new young pastor was hired by the church—a pastor who took a very keen interest in the sexual education of the teenage boys in his church.




The book then moves into the ups and downs of Frank's adult life—his business success in Marin County; his entrance into what seemed destined to be a long-term relationship with a man named Hal; and Frank's eventual spiritual unrest. At one point, as he drove across the Golden Gate Bridge, he considered ending his life. At that moment, the thought came to him, "If you are willing to take your life, are you willing to give it to Me?" This was, of course, not the first time Frank had been thrust into a debate with God over the direction of his life. At age sixteen, he had asked God to change him—and that hadn't happened. At twenty-three, he had also undergone a major frustration that resulted in Frank telling God, "Our relationship is over! You won't change me and I can't serve You the way I am. This conflict will kill me, so it's goodbye!"

Now in his forties and with the help of Mike, one of his employees (who happened to be a Christian), Frank reconciled with the God who had all along wanted Frank as His own. It was, in fact, hearing an audible voice say, "I want you back!" That shook Frank to his core. Soon, Frank was in a solid church where, much to his dismay, it was assumed that Frank would now reach out to others in the gay community. That was not what he wanted. Frank wanted very much to be finished with homosexuality forever. God, however, was leading Frank into a new era. With halting steps at first, a ministry began.

Ads in the Berkeley Barb (the newspaper of renown among the Bay Area counter-culture), a cassette tape ministry, the organizing of meetings, all followed. Years later, and much to Frank's surprise, he met and fell in love with Anita who, alongside Frank, has become a tireless worker on behalf of men and women who were on the journey out of homosexuality.

His story then becomes their story—and the story of the ongoing ministry God entrusted to them. It's a wonderful book, full of hope, pathos, and even humor. At one point, Frank and the ministry faced great opposition (as does any ministry to those struggling with same-sex attractions to this day). One of their witnessing forays into San Francisco led a local gay newspaper to refer to their tactics as "kidnapping" homosexuals. It was untrue of course, but it led to a phone call wherein the caller seriously asked, "What corner do I stand on to be kidnapped so I can get out of homosexuality?"

Destiny Bridge is full of wonderful (though sometimes sad) stories from Frank's life. Not many testimony books work well, but this one does. In fact, this really is a "must-read" for anyone interested in the subject of homosexuality and Christianity. 
