Dear Fellowship Partners,

"God calls us to walk in honesty and integrity. Confession is key to living a victorious life. At the cross of Christ we find liberation from our sinful past. Through relationships, we receive the encouragement to maintain a pure life." This is a core value of Portland Fellowship. Every bit of ministry that is done by Portland Fellowship is colored by the truth of this belief.

However, one arm of ministry here at PF where this core belief takes on the greatest dimension, I believe, is our Upper Room Community.

The Upper Room is a live-in discipleship community that, every year, men and women come to Portland Fellowship to live together in intentional community for nine months, participating in teaching and mentoring geared towards continued emotional and relational healing, spiritual disciplines, and personal development. Although the instruction and counseling that each receive is beneficial, the most life changing element of this experience is the relational dynamic of living in community. The majority of the wounds that people walk into Portland Fellowship with were created in the context of relationship, and it is only in relationship that those wounds can effectively heal. The Upper Room provides a context where that relational healing can occur.

The truth is that, although as a ministry we can provide an environment where relational healing and mutual discipleship can occur (think Proverbs 27:17), we can't make that healing happen. Those who are in the Upper Room have to choose to walk humbly and receptively to the sharpening of the relationships in the community. 2 Peter 1:5-8, states: "Make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, mutual affection; and to mutual affection, love. For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ." We are reminded of the importance of intentional effort towards Christ-like attitudes and behavior, and how this effort helps us know Christ more intimately and effectively. This scripture highlights a number of character qualities that we are to strive towards, qualities that are most effectively demonstrated and attained within relationship. This is not always easy. In fact, it is a constant challenge to not let minor offences, or personality conflicts, rob a community of its healing power, especially when these "minor offences" rub up against significant personal wounds. That is the risk, and opportunity, that the Upper Room presents. Will we make "every effort"

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to demonstrate the character of Christ towards one another even when we offend each other?

This year the men in our Upper Room Community faced many relational challenges, and they had to choose whether they would respond with Christ like character, or respond out of their wounds and immaturity. I am delighted to report that, for the most part, these challenges were met with a desire to reflect Christ to one another. It has been a beautiful experience watching the Lord heal and sharpen these men through their interactions and conflicts with one another. These difficult moments, which could have been destructive, became moments of honest confession as this community held one another up in love and grace. It has been amazing to be a part of God's purpose for this community.

I have loved my year with these men, and am blessed and encouraged with the work that the Holy Spirit has done in and among each of us. I am excited to see what the next year of the Upper Room will bring. Several of the men from this year have requested the chance to continue their journey towards Christ-likeness as a part of this community next year, so we will see what Christ has yet to reveal and refine in them. Pray for this community as they continue to live life together in honesty, and integrity, encouraging one another in a pure life.
