

Repaying with a Blessing by Jason Thompson

"Do not repay evil with evil or insult with insult, but with blessing, because to this you were called so that you may inherit a blessing."—I Peter 3:9

As I was perusing my Facebook feed the other day, I came across a video of two young men preaching on the streets of Israel. Their message was neither fiery nor condemning, but filled with the love of Jesus and His finished work on the cross, which fulfilled the law and brought salvation for all who believe. Their audience, the Jewish people, did not take kindly to their message. Instead of ignoring these preachers like we usually would in the United Sates, the people began taunting and spitting on them. I watched with a sense of wonder as these preachers simply wiped the spit off their faces and continued sharing the love of Christ with people in need of the Gospel.

As the video continued, my mind reflected on what Jesus did. "When they hurled their insults at him, he did not retaliate; when he suffered, he made no threats. Instead, he

entrusted himself to him who judges justly" (I Peter 2:23). I've read these passages many times, and how Jesus endured insults and ridicule, but a deeper sense of that reality hit when I saw this happening in our time: modern Rabbis, dressed in their religious garb, participating in insulting these two young men who were sharing the love of Christ.

I experienced a similar situation many years ago when I was invited to share in a public forum at Portland Community College. The symposium was in the middle of the campus and it included voices from both the gay community and the Christian community. My desire was to share the hope and freedom that I have found in Christ, and invite those who were personally conflicted with their faith and sexuality to explore answers through God's Word. I went into the event with a bit of naïvety and found myself in the

middle of a mob of angry liberal students, and feeling way in over my head.

During the Q&A portion of the event, an intimidating looking student took the mic, stood inches from my face and began to shout that I was the one responsible for gay and lesbian kids who choose suicide. Following this accusation came insults, name-calling and mocking. In that moment, I remember having a choice. I could respond with a counter-argument and defend myself, and even insult them in return, or I could remain quiet, thank the angry student for sharing his thoughts and then continue to share the love of God for gay and lesbian students. By the Holy Spirit alone, I choose the latter.

One of the most common questions I'm asked by friends and supporters of Portland Fellowship is how we are "holding up" in our current culture. The question is a good one, as the momentum of acceptance of homosexuality is so strong that anyone even hinting at non-acceptance of homosexual behavior is considered hateful in heart and archaic in thinking. In short, the response to this question is that we are holding up well, but again, only by the blessing and favor of the Lord.

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If we, as a ministry, truly believe what is written in I Peter 3:9, we know that blessings come when we love our enemies, do good to those who hate us, bless those who curse us and pray for those who mistreat us. Many times, this paradox of the Christian life doesn't make sense in this world, but in the Kingdom of God it makes divine sense. Over and over again, responding in love has proven to either transform hearts or quickly diffuse an escalating situation.

Over the years, I have received my fair share of hate mail. Since the late '90s, this has primarily been in the form of email. I made a decision years ago that no matter how rude, vile or insulting a correspondence may be, I would reply to the person and save the conversation. My heart has been to reply with the love of Christ, in order for the recipient to experience even a moment of grace from someone they thought would exchange insult with insult.

The following emails are a small sample of what I have received. I've censored some words to keep you from unnecessary vile.

Sent: Friday, April 8, 2005 8:46 PM

I think your website is ridiculous. I looked it over and nothing in it made me want to go ***** a woman. You're a fool. Go to school and learn something else.

My Reply:

Thank you for taking the time to respond and for looking at our website. I'm thankful you didn't find anything on the site that would make you want to violate a woman like that, as we are to honor and cherish women, made in the image of God. I pray you will only find respect, encouragement and hope on our site. Blessings, Jason

Sent: Friday, August 27, 2004 2:54 PM

Homosexuality is neither painful nor confusing...what kind of crock of **** is this? Being gay is as natural as being straight...but evidently, you're a moron who must have major issues with your own self-respect and homosexuality....Repression is the problem...people like you are the problem...not men and women who are attracted to the same sex...just as god intended.

My Reply:

Thank you for your email. As you shared, you have not found homosexuality to be painful or confusing, yet for me, it was both. I'm grateful that nobody has forced you to seek something you are not wanting or ready to receive. I'm also grateful that God offered Portland Fellowship as a safe and loving place for me to know who I am in Christ. I pray you have a great day.

You sound like a real piece of work, Jason.

My Reply:

I'm assuming you meant for your comment to be negative, but the first thing that came to my mind is—Yes, that's true! I am God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for me to do. I pray you one day will desire that for yourself as well.

Ok honest question and I am expecting no less than an honest answer. Why do you hate us? There is some homosexuals that give us a bad name and the media at times does too. But thats no different then what strippers and porn stars do you woman. And dont say what the bible says. I am christian and know very well what it says - but the bible was not written by God but mearly people just like me and you. No different. I know what your answer will be already. But I am saddened that you are a hypocrite and all of you will burn in hell just as I will if all is true. I am happy and as are many people I know...why cant you all just leave us alone. If you are all right and I am wrong then it is not your soul to save. Just leave us in peace.

My Reply:

I'm sorry to hear of your impression of our ministry. As you ask that I don't lump all homosexuals together, please don't lump me in with hate-filled Christians that judge those with same-sex longings. I refuse to hate, judge and burden or hurt anyone. If I ever do that, please specifically rebuke me for that and I would hope that I would humbly receive your correction. The God I serve sent His Son to save and redeem the lost. I always desire my heart to be the same. Peace, Jason.

His Reply:

...not the response I was expecting...and sorry for my email as well. It was just a sad night last night. I am sorry I assumed. Its just not so easy being gay and happy (in which case I am, and not willing to change) and having people tell me I need to change. once again I am sorry...

My Reply:

I'm sorry to hear of the difficult evening last night. You say it was sad. If you want to talk about it, I would love to listen. By the way, many will tell you many things about what you need to do. I encourage you to ask what God desires of you. If you sincerely ask him, He will sincerely reply. I hope tonight is a better evening. Blessings, Jason.

Responding in love and with kindness goes against our own sense of reasoning. Yet, if we choose to keep our mind and heart on the knowledge and love of God, we will be able to respond according to His will. I know that kindness is not simply being agreeable as many false teachers are now preaching. The kindness of God that leads to repentance isn't simply being nice. This kindness is that God is mercifully withholding His judgement so that all may come to know Him. Therefore our "kind" response must include loving truth or direction that awakens a person to the reality of their spiritual needs and their standing with the Lord.

As PF continues to be a light in a very dark world, and as you respond to your friends or family member that have lost their way, my prayer is that we will always seek to bless those who curse us, and that through those blessings the love and mercy of God will shine through.

Emotional separation because of differing opinions is painful, but losing a loved one is excruciating, often with words left unsaid, arguments left unresolved and affections left unexpressed. 
