

Turning Toward Truth by Roy

On the surface, it seemed I had every reason to get things right in life. I was a good kid. I

was raised in the church, got good grades and had friends that stayed out of trouble. I had a mother and father who provided well for my sister and I. Both of my grandfathers passed away before I was born, and my maternal grandmother was the glue that held the family together. She was deeply centered in Christ and served Him in all she did. As a young child, I was constantly around Christ-centered community which gathered around Jesus to worship, build His Church, fellowship and show His love to the world. I believe the Spirit of God was heavily present during this time, teaching me through others about who He is.

Even in the midst of a family and church environment that was uplifting, I struggled with feelings of low self-worth, poor body image and rejection, both actual and imagined. My interests were different than other boys, or so I felt. I was quiet by nature, musical and creative. I liked people, but I wasn't very outgoing, which led to seasons of loneliness. While I felt I didn't measure up in the outside world, I always felt I belonged in my family and in the church. In my pre-teens the Lord started to reveal Himself to me more deeply and I didn't want to be without Him, so I accepted Him as my savior and was baptized.



When I was twelve, my parents moved us to a church closer to our home with a large youth group for sister and I. This new church was "open and affirming," which meant openly gay people were welcomed and embraced. The gay and lesbian people I met there were gentle, caring and fun. While this church pushed "love and tolerance," I was watching the church body embrace sin of all kinds, while being told the church was making a good and progressive move toward God. I encountered poor doctrine that accommodated people in their sin, and did not call them to repentance in Christ. It caused me to think differently about sin and my own sexuality at an age when being gay wasn't even a consideration.

Before I knew it, my family had embraced pro-gay theology and worldly living. In my teens, I liked girls, but same-sex attractions were arising too, and I needed help determining what I could do about it. The more I studied on my own, the more I realized my church wasn't addressing the sins mentioned in the Bible. Homosexuality, fornication, Satan and repentance weren't addressed or even mentioned.

My family was rocked by a series of tragedies during my teen years. The one that hit me the hardest was my uncle's death in a boating accident when I was seventeen. He wasn't much older than me, and I looked up to him like a brother. About two years after that, my grandmother and another uncle died just a few months a part. From that point on, things spun out of control for me. I was hurting and confused about my identity and the church. I was angry at the world and with God, and my gay feelings were not going away.

Roy is a recent graduate of PF's two-year Taking Back Ground program, and will be serving as aTBG leader this year. I entered a period of seeking God to deal with my samesex attractions. I couldn't reconcile my homosexual feelings with what the Bible says, and I wrongly believed turning to Christ would make my SSA disappear instantly, but it didn't. I felt God had failed me, and my anger took root. I started to rebel against Him and tried to numb the pain with alcohol, drugs and pornography, but nothing helped. At age twenty, I decided to act out on my gay feelings since God hadn't taken them away. I had one encounter with a young man I met in

college. I left that experience feeling dirty, like I'd made a big mistake and I'd disappointed God. I realized homosexuality wasn't right for me, and I repented and vowed never to do it again. And I didn't for the next seven years.

Those years were full of spiritual attacks. I eventually stepped away from

the faith and embraced a gay identity for almost a decade. I moved to San Francisco, and with that move came feelings of freedom and fun times, initially. I was confused and broken, going from relationship to relationship, and every time it was the same story: I'd meet another broken man, confused about his identity, and we would seek approval and validation in each other to ease the wounds we'd encountered earlier in life. Many of these men were addicted to alcohol, drugs, pornography or sex. Each time, I was hopeful about where the relationship was going, but each quickly devolved into chaos, disappointment and heartache. But strong-willed as I am, I was determined to make it work.

After a few years in the gay life, I felt empty. I was far from God and wanted a relationship with Him again. I decided to find another "open and affirming" church and a "gay Christian" partner, which I did. We started building a life together, but the Lord began wrestling with me and telling me that I wasn't living the life He had for me. God was calling me out of the gay life, but I couldn't see how that was possible. The enemy had a stronghold. I was drawn to the sin and excitement of gay life. I was used to worldly living, a luxurious life and heavy drinking. I liked it, and although I knew my lifestyle wasn't working, something in me didn't want to leave.

It wasn't until I almost died in a freak accident that God got my attention again. The Lord spared my life, and I was listening. He made it clear that I needed to end my gay relationship and turn to Christ. I ended the relationship, but I never fully turned back toward Him. I was single for a couple of months, but overwhelmed by loneliness, I returned to the gay life and found another man. We were best friends with a similar sense of humor, cared for one another and had fun



together. I knew I was willfully stepping away from God while he was calling me back to Himself. As I struggled to leave this relationship, it became clear that I was a slave to sin. I tried to break up with this guy and turn to Christ, but I repeatedly ran back. I couldn't stop sinning. I was hooked by the sexual intimacy and enjoyed the companionship.

I prayed and asked the Lord what to do. He answered that prayer by leading me to take a few days' vacation by myself in Portland. When the train pulled into Union Station,

> something hit my spirit: the Lord was showing me where He was sending me. I didn't know how it would happen, but I knew I had to trust Him and move to Portland. Upon returning to San Francisco, I was sure the Lord was tired of my rebellion and I knew that if I didn't leave the gay life

soon, the windows He was opening would close. This time, I yielded to the Lord's call to leave the gay life for good.

I'd like to say my journey from that point has been easy. It hasn't, but the Lord has shown Himself faithful. I came across Portland Fellowship's website just before I moved to Portland. After meeting with Jason Thompson, I was certain this was the right program to help me deal with my SSA and stay out of the gay life. Since leaving my old life behind, God has opened incredible doors for me. He's provided for my job, housing, given me Christ-centered friends and carried me through Taking Back Ground and the Upper Room at PF.

As I've explained to Christian family and friends from my past why I left the gay life, I've been met with some resistance. Some have told me leaving isn't necessary, because they believe homosexuality is compatible with the Christian faith. It is not. The Word will not change to accommodate our sin. I learned this lesson the hard way through the decade I lived as a gay man, and I don't want to see anyone else become deceived and experience what I went through.

In the past, I'd heard people say there's freedom in Christ. Today, I can truly say I'm experiencing that freedom, and I owe Him my all. God has changed my nature and my desires over the last few years. It didn't happen overnight, but it has happened, through a commitment to prayer and fasting, study of the Word, the rejection of sin and by yielding to the Holy Spirit. Leaving my old life and allowing Christ's nature to be formed in me has been an exciting, challenging and sometimes painful process, but in Him is the only place I want to be. I encourage anyone struggling with sin of any kind to repent and turn toward Jesus Christ. He is faithful to complete the good work He starts in us.
